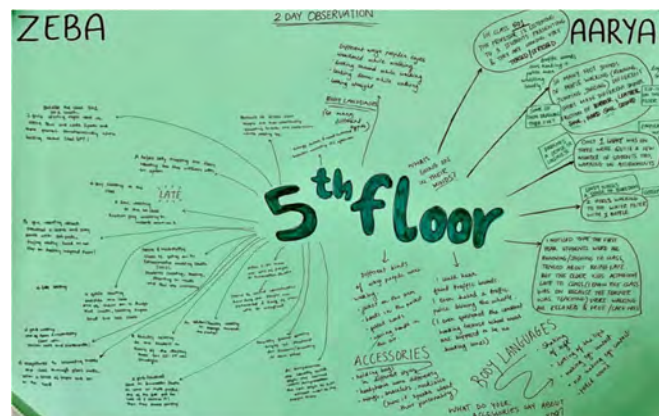


Figure 1: Demonstrates the Mind map.

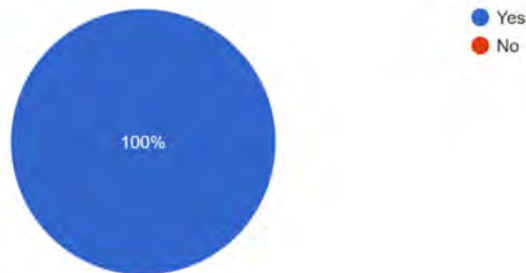


Figure 2: Demonstrates the Owning Sneakers.

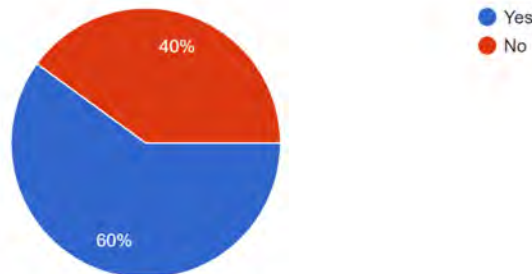


Figure 3: Demonstrate the Awareness of sneaker culture.

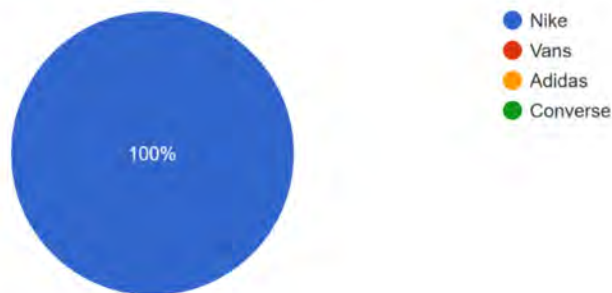


Figure 4: Demonstrate the Popular sneaker brand in Atlas Skilltech.

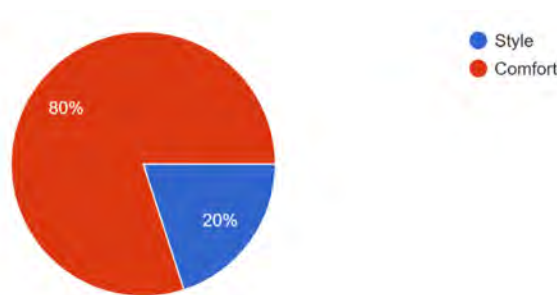


Figure 5: Demonstrates the Importance of style versus comfort.

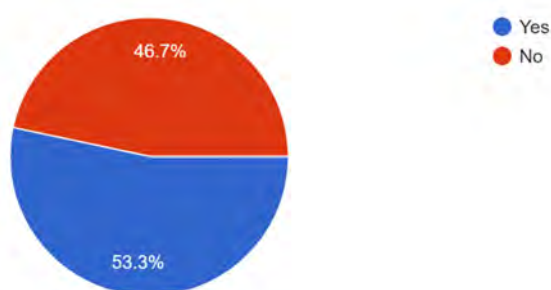


Figure 6: Demonstrates the Perception of sneakers being overpriced.

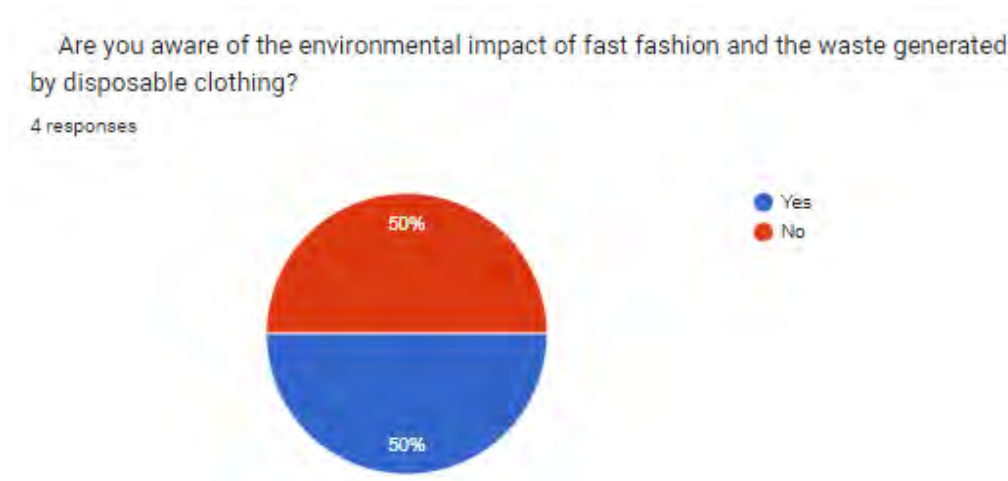


Figure 1: Awareness of the environmental impact of fast fashion and the waste generated by disposable clothing.

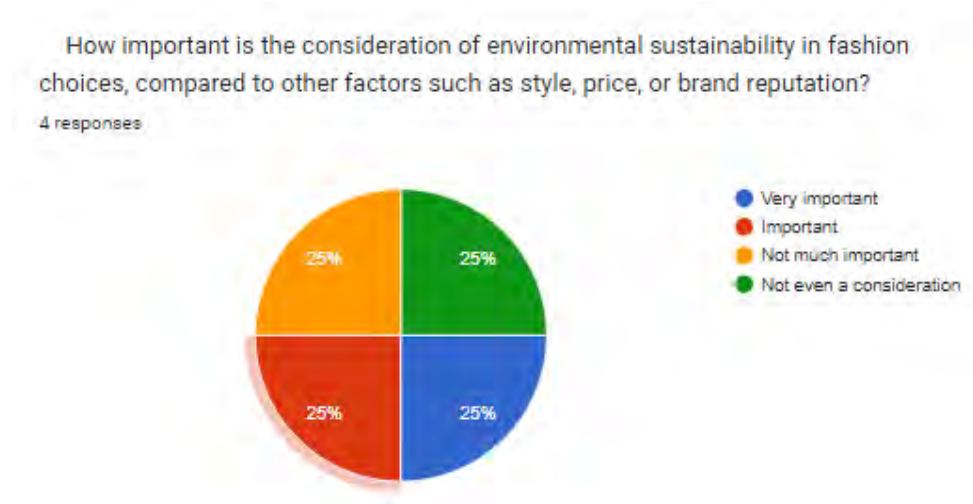


Figure 2: The relative significance of environmental sustainability in consumer fashion decisions alongside other factors such as style, price, and brand reputation.
