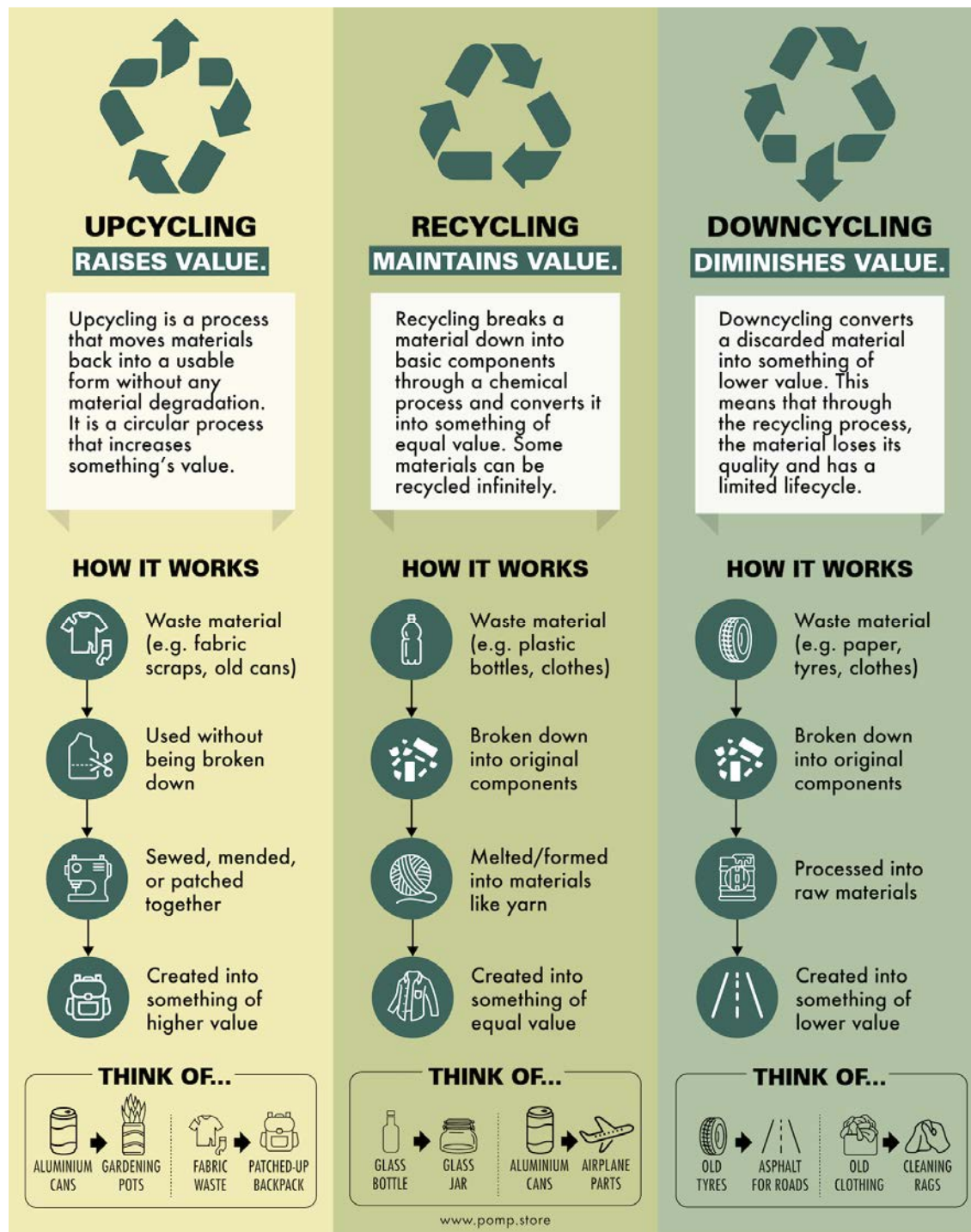

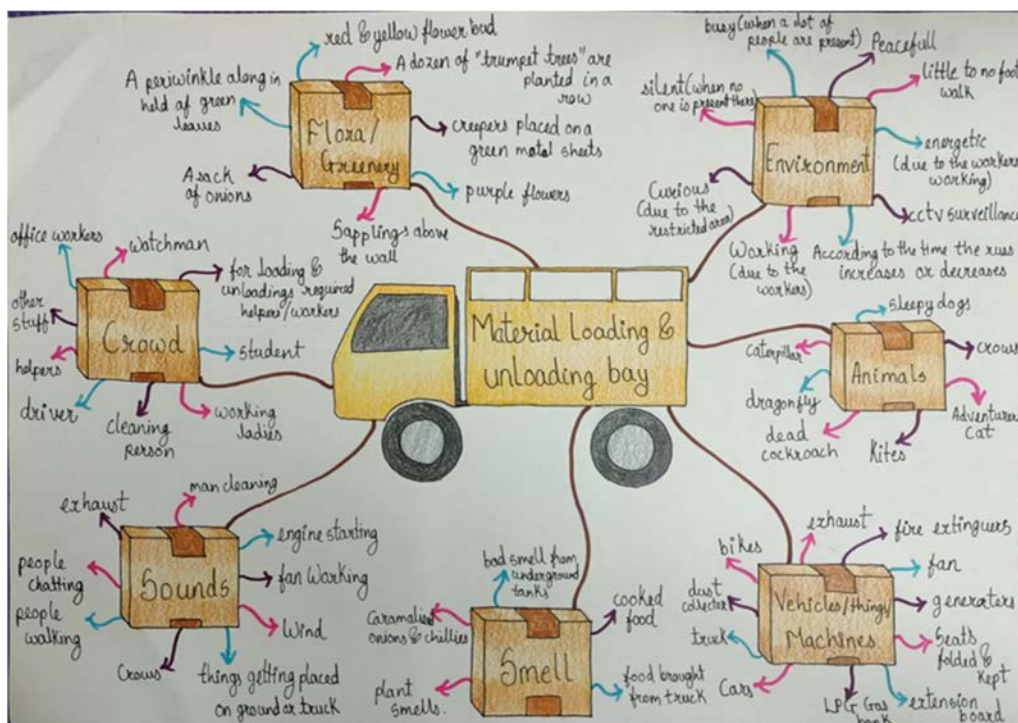

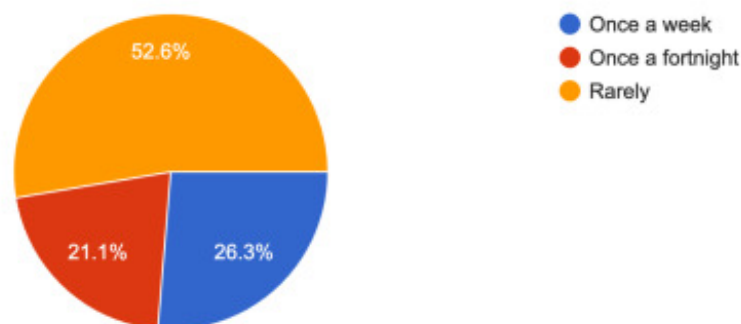

**Figure 1: Demonstrates Comparison of Starbucks Visit Frequency Over Time.**

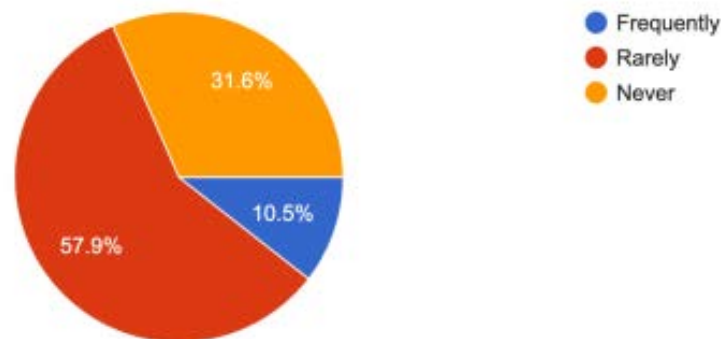

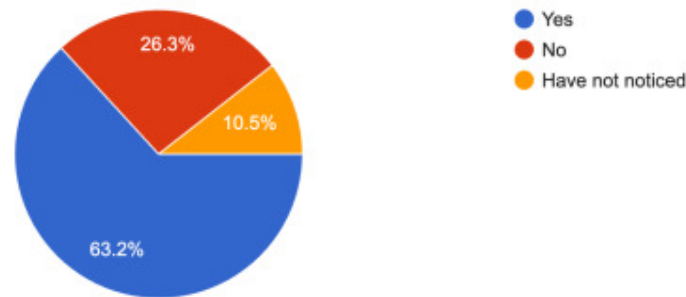


**Figure 2: Demonstrates the Frequency of Using Starbucks as a Workspace.**

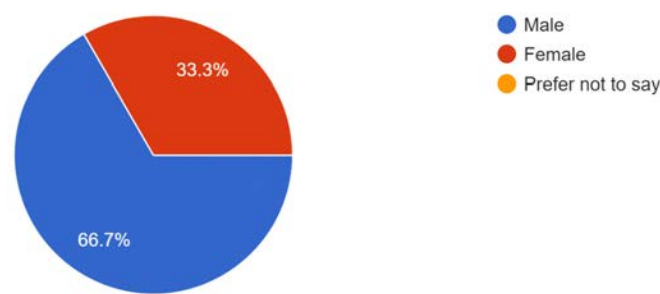


Figure 1: Demonstrates the Age and Location.

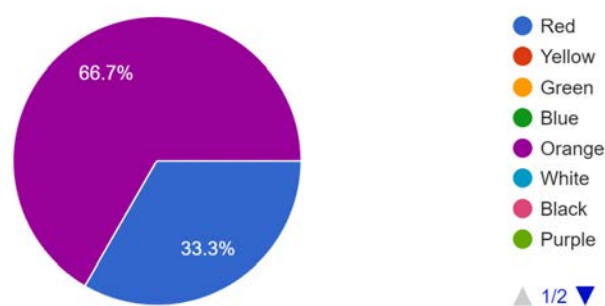
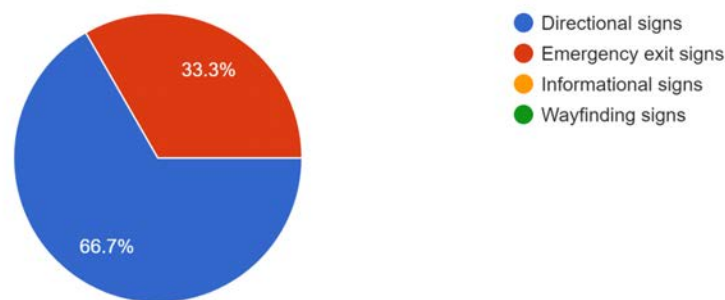


Figure 2: Demonstrates the Font and Color Preferences.

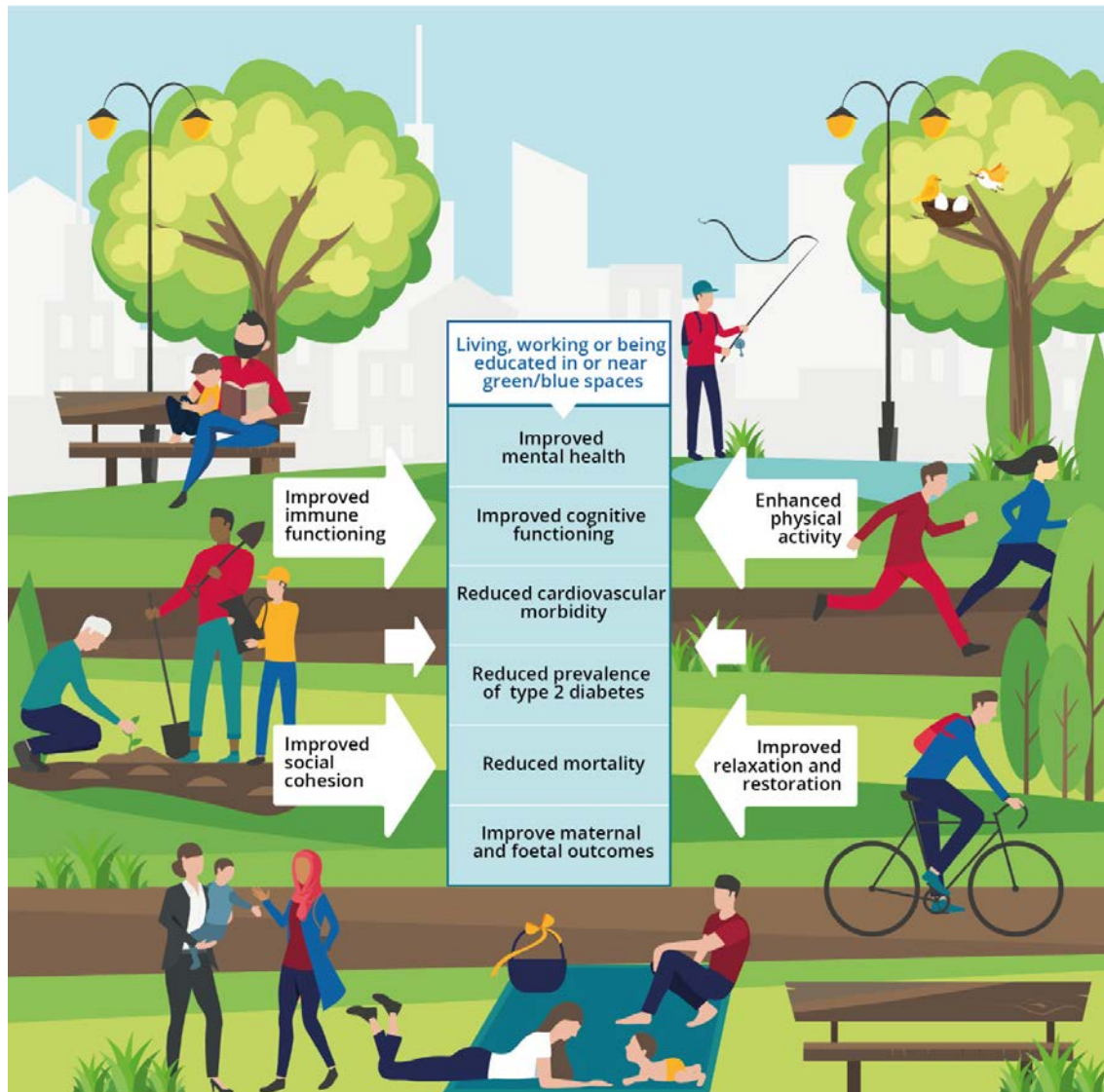

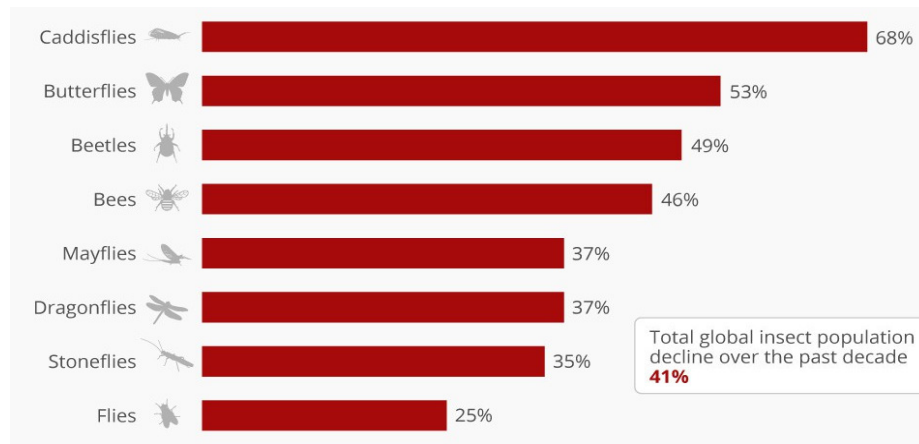

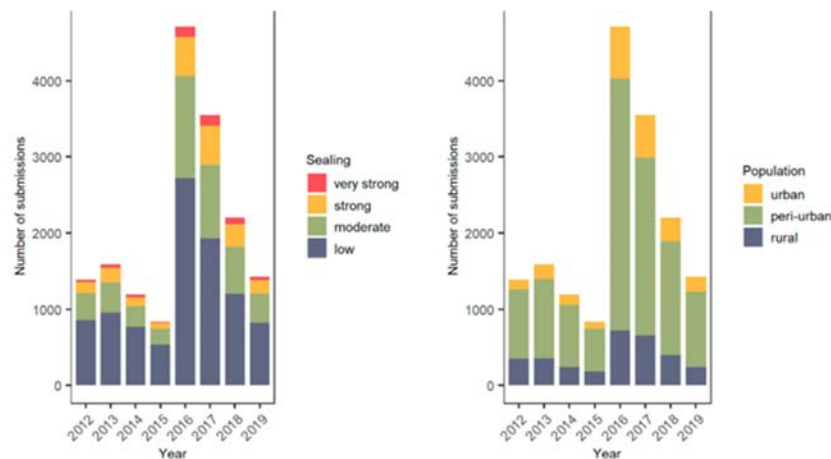


**Figure 1: Reports depict the massive insect decline that threatens the collapse of Nature.**
